Presidential messages

Introducing the Rotary Youth Network
How do you take the best from the worst?

None of us will forget how the pandemic altered our world and our lives. Each of us had to traverse this

period of uncertainty, and no one had a free pass from the effects.

I personally believe this has created space for a different kind of global leadership — one that is courageous, empathetic, and vulnerable. I met my good friend Anniela Carracedo online in early 2020. She is one such leader, and I'm thrilled to turn this month's column over to her.

In March 2020, I had a panic attack. I couldn't breathe, and I felt a terrible pain in my chest. It had been a few days since the World Health Organization declared COVID-19 a global pandemic, and I was in the middle of my year as a Rotary Youth Exchange student in the United States. Think about it: an 18-year-old girl stuck in a different country, with a foreign language, with people she had only met six months before. It was scary.

But I am familiar with uncertainty. I was born and raised in Venezuela, which is going through one of the worst humanitarian and political crises in the Western Hemisphere. But my mom always said, "Challenges are nothing more than needs that require a solution."

I called up my Interact and Youth Exchange friends. Together, we organized an online meeting to share projects and get inspired by what everyone else was doing during the quarantine. In that first meeting, we had 70 people, mainly students, from 17 countries.

From that beginning, we built an online platform for Rotary youths worldwide to share their experiences and inspire others with project ideas during isolation. We looked for mentors and supporters who would help our group connect young people, share cultures, and open new collaborative opportunities for international service projects. We called it Rotary Interactive Quarantine, or RIQ.

After only a year, we engaged with more than 5,000 students from 80 countries. Several of our team members became district Interact representatives and district committee members, and some of us even serve on Rotary International councils. Eventually, quarantine restrictions were being lifted, and the needs of our participants were changing. At our last official meeting as RIQ, Past RI President Barry Rassin inspired us to create even bigger change, so we transformed RIQ into the Rotary Youth Network, or RYN.

A few of our members, including me, were selected to serve on the inaugural Interact Advisory Council, where we presented our vision for youth in Rotary to the RI Board of Directors.

Our presentation to the Board inspired President Jennifer and her team to create a Youth Advisory Council in Rotary International, which I am honored to serve on as a co-chair.

The Rotary Youth Network officially launched during a breakout session at the 2022 Rotary International Convention in Houston. Five of us, who had participated in Interact, Youth Exchange, and Rotary Youth Leadership Awards, traveled across continents to launch an organization we had kicked off online two years before. The convention was also the first time we had met in person. When my friends and I finished our talk, we realized more than 500 people were giving us a standing ovation. Tears filled our eyes, and the feeling of excitement and accomplishment took over.

Who would have thought that a panic attack would lead to this?

SERVICE IN ACTION

FOUR WAYS TO EMPOWER YOUR COMMUNITY; A CASE FOR SEBOBBO COMMUNITY EMPOWERMENT PROJECT.

"Every real dream begins with a dreamer. Always remember you have within you the strength, the patience and the PASSION to reach for the stars to change the world."

Rotary clubs all over the world work with communities to advance local economies. Every community has different needs and different opportunities for service.

The United Nations reports that a million jobs are needed in East Africa for new entrants to the labor market between 2016 and 2030. Unemployment, underemployment, lack of economic opportunity, lack of appropriate training, and the absence of social safety nets lie at the core of poverty.

Sebobbo Community Empowerment Project (SCEP) is no exception. SCEP is expected to be a high-impact project. The piece of land (2 acres) for the project was offered by the Past Change Maker President, Samuel Majwega Musoke (RIP) in 2021. It is a hybrid project which will cover all key areas of Rotary service participation; health, water and sanitation, education, community development, peace & stability and environment.

Project implementation was preceded by community assessment on the most urgent development needs. The assessment revealed economic and community development needs, that included;

- Youth unemployment
- -Obstacles to entrepreneurship
- -Barriers to agricultural opportunities and livelihood
- ·Lack of resources to address extreme poverty.

About Sebobbo Community

Sebobbo is found in Mityana District, Ssekanyonyi sub-country, Busunju Parish, It's located 72 kms south west of Kampala, Uganda Capital city and 27 kms from Mityana Municipal Council, the largest urban centre in the District. However, it also lies about 9kms from Busunju, a small township along Kampala-Hoima Road with an altitude of 3,870 ft (1,180 m) above sea level. Sekanyoyi, of which Sebobbo is a part, is a rural settlement with a pollution estimated by at 35,000 inhabitants. Female residents are estimated at 47% of this population and about 54% of the population estimated are below 18 years. The number of households in Sekanyonyi is estimated at over 7,000 of whom at least one quarter (26.3%) are headed by women. Subsistence farming is the main economic activity; most households derive their food from the gardens and sell some of it to meet household needs. However, poverty (income poverty) levels are significantly high with at least 13.8% of inhabitants estimated to be living on less than USD2 per day.

Below is the description of ways RC Bunga has taken to address these identified developmental needs in Sebobbo Kiweeka, Ssekanyonyi sub-County, Mityana District in Central Uganda

Adopt-a-village

Bunga RC chose to adopt-a-village as a way to address the extreme poverty holistically in Sebobbo, a community that lacks the resources to meet basic human needs. With active involvement from the community, we have started with investing in the leadership skills of community members to implement a multifaceted but coordinated strategy within. The ultimate project goal is to increase self-sufficiency of individuals and families and help them revitalize their community by alleviating extreme poverty. A successful adopt-a-village initiative will result in a community-created plan to continue local development and improve lives beyond the project.

A Rotary Community Corps: We have sponsored a group of local activists and organized them into an action committee as partners in service. We hope this will help us have a clear link with the community and provide access to information about the community, challenges, successes, and monitoring and evaluation.

Sebobbo Youth Empowerment (SYEP)

The Sebbobo Youth Empowerment Project (SYEP) is an initiative of the Rotary Club of Bunga implemented under the umbrella Sebbobo Community Project in conjunction with the Rotary Vijana POA Secretariat. SYEP is about youth empowerment focusing on youth skilling, leadership development and creating opportunities for employment. The project's intervention specifically targets; (i) organisation of the youths to expand their capacity to bargain collectively (ii) development of entrepreneurship skills and mind-set change to spur community development activities among the youth at Sebbobo, and (iii) development of local capacity for environmental management.

Call to action

Bunga RC is well suited to carry out this project. However, it is a big project and would require significant resources to undertake. We will seek partnerships with other Clubs and people of good will from far and wide to collaborate in the implementation of this project.



COMMISSIONING OF THE RI-USAID

WASH PROJECT IN BIGASA, BUKOMANSIMBI DISTRICT





20th April 2023:

Our District 9214 Governor, Peace Taremwa, COMMISSIONED the 4th Phase of the gigantic CLEAN WATER DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM to nearly 120 homeeads, 6 schools, churches, Police Station and a health center 111. A joint project with RC Masaka, it was initiated by RC Bunga in 2020/2021 and funded by the two clubs on a smaller scale, but majorly funded by Rotary International and USAID up to the tune of \$400,000 to date. Water taps all over Bigasa are a spectacle to comprehend where school kids used to fetch water 2kms away.

The water reservoir, 43000 Its capacity, is filled by set of solar panels which power the heavy duty water pump at source. No need for hydro electric power. The Governor had advised each user shud pay 1000sh into a pool for maintenance and repairs., and residents were complying. BUT THE ROTARIAN TO THANK MOST IS Rtn Christine Ndiwalana, MP, who initiated, cordinated, paid big amounts in dollars in excess of what the Club had paid at times. Thank you IPP Rtn Berna, for enabling this project when you were President in 2020. Thank you VP Teopista for guaranting the project this year 2022.

HOW IS THE CURRENT TRF and ANNUAL FUND GIVING BY ROTARY CLUB OF BUNGA TO DATE?



SERVICE PROJECTS A Growing Feature Of Rc Bunga

Service projects as a major feature of Rotary across the world. Rotary uses projects for short strategic interventions aimed at making a difference to local communities in the areas of health, water and sanitation, education, community development, peace and stability and environmental protection.

Over the few years of its existence, and learning from the Rotary fraternity across the world, RC Bunga has equally selected use of projects to meet its commitment to the service of community. In the earlier years, this has focussed mainly on relatively very short-term interventions – implemented within one year, such as through support to immunisation drives within the Ggaba area or elsewhere such as in Bukomansimbi, 120km south west of Kampala through partnership with the area Woman Member of Parliament (Dr. Ndiwalana), or through raising funds to meet specific medical needs of vulnerable members of the community for instance as those requiring specialised surgery abroad. Many of these have often been short term events (one day in many cases) and have been impactful over the years.

After 5 years of existence, and with growing membership, stability and profile, RC Bunga is reviewing and changing its strategy about the choice of projects. Short-term (1-2 days) project such as those above are easy to mobilize funding for, as they are often low-cot, and easy to manage. Member resources are required for only very short time and so the Club is not stretched. However, the Club has also learnt that their impacts are equally short-lived. Besides, where they are delivered in partnership, RC Bunga has often very limited means to direct the outcome. They therefore tend to return very limited visibility for the Club.

The new strategy, adopted over the past year, is to shift attention to medium term projects implemented over 3 to 5 years but where the Club will have a significant advantage in terms of control and direction. This size of project will naturally involve bigger budgets and more resources on part of the Club. One such Club is the Sebbobo Community Empowerment project launched earlier this year with an implementation plan of 3-4 years. As has been discussed in this newsletter, the project, when it is all completed, has the potential to transform a community of 1,500 to 2000 households in the area of Sekanyonyi, in Mityana district through improved services for health, water and sanitation, early childhood education, and youth empowerment and employment program. The project has a significant budget outlay – estimated at over UGX 1.6bn much larger that the smalle projects. RC Bunga is looking at engaging local and international partnerships to share this cost over period of implementation.

Implementing large projects places significant demands on the Club resources as well. Seeing the growing operations of the Club and aware that its members are unable to allocate more than a small amount of their time, during the year, the Club appointed a Club administrator to improve is administrative capacity, and importantly, to support the increasing demand for project management. The Club is also strengthening its financial management systems so that it can track and account better for receipts towards projects and expenditures. These improvements will take time, but the Club has determined, these are necessary for its change in strategy.

The Club will continue to deliver short term projects, and to participate in other service projects where it does not play a lead role, but to a less extent. Emphasis will now be on the larger projects because of the long-term benefits to the communities it services and the visibility this brings to the Club. Even then, in order not to outstretch the Club's capacity, in the short to medium term, the Club will retain one large project – the Sebbobo Community Empowerment as its signature project, and one major partnership through Ggaba project which is equally a major project but where it plays a less lead role. It will aim not to spread out its resources so that it can realise it goals under these projects in the shortest possible time.
